The order for worship is in the Book of Common Prayer (BCP), the red book on the back of the pews. Hymns are in the blue book unless the lyrics are printed in the bulletin. Hymns with "S" before the number are grouped at the beginning of the hymnal.

You are welcome to add your prayer requests to the Prayers of the People in the notebook on the Ushers' Desk at the rear of the nave.

Children may remain in the worship service with their parents or, at the 11:00 service, if ages 2-12, they may begin in the nursery (the room to the left of the church offices) and enjoy Sunday school before returning to their parents' care as Holy Communion begins. Supervised play time available after the service until 2:00 in the rectory garden—<u>only</u> with two unrelated adults present.

About Today's Eucharist

The spirituality of the Celtic peoples of Britain and Ireland is distinctive. The Celts believed that the presence of God infused daily life, so that at any moment, any object, any job, could become a place for encounter with God. Thus the Celtic peoples offered prayers throughout the day for everyday activities: getting up, lighting the fire, getting dressed, and even milking the cow. Esther de Waal, a theologian of Celtic spirituality, put it this way: "The Celtic approach to God opens up a world in which nothing is too common to be exalted and nothing is so exalted that it cannot be made common."

The Celtic prayers for today's service come from a variety of sources and are characterized by a profound love of nature and an awareness of the unity of creation. While the Celtic Christians did not worship nature, they did affirm with wonder the One who created all things, and, in Christ, redeemed the whole created order. The Celtic peoples also strongly emphasized the Trinity to remind themselves that the One God, who is three Persons in relationship, is love. God is Community within Himself and Christian community flows from this reality: God the Father is FOR us, God the Son is WITH us, and God the Holy Spirit is IN us. The Holy Scriptures, thus, are God's memory book of relationships and encounter.

A plaque on the door of a church in Graigecullen, County Carlow, captures the Celtic sense of awe with some advice, which seems appropriate preparation for today's service:

Enter this door as if the floor within were gold;

And every wall of jewels all of wealth untold;

As if a choir in robes of fire were singing here;

Nor shout nor rush but hush ... for God is here.

The Epistle

A Reading from Pauls' Letter to the Ephesians (2:1-10)

You were dead through the trespasses and sins in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

Jesus said, "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.



The Sermon

St. Patrick's Creed



There is no other God, and there never was another, nor will there be any after him except God the Father, without beginning. From him is all beginning. He upholds all things.

And his Son Jesus Christ whom together with the Father we testify to have always existed.

Before the beginning of the world he was spiritually present with the Father. Begotten in an indescribable manner before all beginning. By him all things visible and invisible were made. He was made man, and having overcome death was received into heaven to the Father: And the Father has bestowed on him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord and God. In him we believe, and we await his coming who before long shall judge the quick and dead.

He will render to everyone according to his deeds, and has poured out abundantly on us the gift of the Holy Spirit, even the pledge of immortality, who makes those that believe and obey to be the sons of God the Father and joint-heirs with Christ. Him we confess and adore one God in the Trinity of the sacred name.

Eucharistic Prayer 1 with Extended Preface

*The beginning of this Eucharistic Prayer comes from the *Stowe Missal*, a small Irish illuminated manuscript written mainly in Latin with some Old Irish in the late eighth or early ninth century.

Celebrant: The Lord be with you. All: And also with you. Celebrant: Lift up your hearts. All: We lift them up to the Lord. Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. All: It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Celebrant: Father, all powerful and ever living God, We do well always and everywhere to give you thanks through Jesus Christ our Lord. You, with your only begotten Son and the Holy Spirit are God. You are God, one immortal; Incorruptible and unmoving; Invisible and faithful; Wonderful and worthy of praise; Strong and worthy of honour;

You are God, most high and magnificent; Living and true; Wise and powerful; Holy and splendid; Great and good;

You are God, awesome and peace-loving; Beautiful and righteous; Pure and kind; Blessed and just; Tender and holy;

You are God, not in the singularity of one person, But in the Trinity of substance. All: We believe you; We bless you; We adore you and praise your name forevermore. We praise you Through Christ who is the salvation of the universe; Through Christ who is the life of human beings; Through Christ who is the resurrection of the dead.

Celebrant: Through him the angels praise your majesty; the dominations adore; the powers of the heaven of heavens tremble; the virtues and the blessed seraphim concelebrate in exultation; so grant, we pray you, that our voices may be admitted to that of the chorus, in humble declarations of your glory as we sing:

The Sanctus

*This second part of the Eucharistic Prayer comes from the *Anaphora of the Apostolic Tradition*, one of the oldest existing liturgies of Christian Eucharist, mid-3rd c.

Celebrant: We give thanks to you God, through your beloved son Jesus Christ, whom you sent to us in former times as Savior, Redeemer, and Messenger of your Will, who is your inseparable Word, through whom you made all, and in whom you were well-pleased, whom you sent from heaven into the womb of a virgin, who, being conceived within her, was made flesh, and appeared as your Son, born of the Holy Spirit and the virgin.

Hymnal S-122

All: It is he who, fulfilling your will and acquiring for you a holy people, extended his hands in suffering, in order to liberate from sufferings those who believe in you.

Celebrant: Who, when he was delivered to voluntary suffering, in order to dissolve death, and break the chains of the devil, and tread down hell, and bring the just to the light, and set the limit, and manifest the resurrection, taking the bread, and giving thanks to you, said, "Take, eat, for this is my body which is broken for you."

Likewise the chalice, saying, This is my blood which is shed for you. Whenever you do this, do this [in] memory of me.

All: Therefore, remembering his death and resurrection, we offer to you the bread and the chalice, giving thanks to you, who has made us worthy to stand before you and to serve as your [people].

Celebrant: And we pray that you would send your Holy Spirit to [this offering] of your Holy Church. In their gathering together, give to all those who partake of your holy mysteries the fullness of the Holy Spirit, toward the strengthening of the faith in truth, *All*: that we may praise you and glorify you, through your son Jesus Christ, through whom to you be glory and honor, Father and Son, with the Holy Spirit,

in your Holy Church, now and always, AMEN.

Celebrant: As our Saviour taught us, we now pray: *All*: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory for ever and ever. Amen.
